FREE COMMUNITY SEMINARS SHARE HISTORIC PRESERVATION ESSENTIALS ON SIX ISLANDS

Nine Seminars to be held from August 6th through 16th

HONOLULU: Historic Hawai'i Foundation (HHF), in partnership with the National Park Service (NPS), will offer a free community seminar in Kawaihae and Honoka'a, Hawai'i Island; Lahaina and Hāna, Maui; Kalamaula, Moloka'i; Princeville and Hanapēpē, Kaua'i; Lāna'i City, Lāna'i and Hale'iwa, O'ahu.

The three-hour seminar will provide an overview of historic preservation essentials in the context of each island community. Topics covered include: the purpose of preservation; the framework, inclusive of roles and responsibilities; stewardship of historic properties; best practices and tips for success and preservation tools and resources.

The content is directed toward all community members and professionals who are interested in preserving Hawaii's historic and cultural places.

"Preserving the historic resources of a community improves quality of life, encourages local pride and stewardship of place and provides a tangible connection between the past and the present," said Kiersten Faulkner, Executive Director of Historic Hawai'i Foundation. "In addition, preservation provides economic, cultural, environmental and educational benefits helping communities thrive and remain relevant in present times."

Presenters will include Dr. Elaine Jackson-Retondo, the Preservation Partnerships and History Programs Manager in the National Park Service Pacific West Regional Office, and Kiersten Faulkner, Executive Director of Historic Hawai'i Foundation.
