Preservation Resource Center. The Center is core to our mission and all that we do. 

We look forward to continuing this effort as together we strive to protect, educate, advocate and assist to ensure the perpetuation of Hawaii's historic places for the coming generations.

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## 2013 Year in Review

## Promote an Ethic of Preservation: Planning, Policy and Education

#### **Public Policy and Legislation**

During the 2013 State Legislative Session, Historic Hawai'i Foundation monitored and responded to bills and resolutions that would affect protection of historic properties. At least 72 bills related to preservation, planning, permitting, culture, arts, environment and related topics were introduced. HHF researched and submitted testimony on several matters. These included:

- Support for a state income tax credit for rehabilitation of historic properties
- Support for increased and more specific statement of qualifications for the State Historic Preservation Officer
- Support for funding for positions at the State Historic Preservation Division and for capital funding for historic properties
- Opposition to exempting development projects from permitting and review processes
- Opposition to allowing SHPD to review single projects in phases without additional safeguards for cultural resources, and
- Technical comments on various matters that would affect historic resources.

#### **Legislative Briefing**

HHF works to educate government officials about historic preservation through activities such as legislative orientations or issue briefings. In January, HHF organized a legislative briefing on historic preservation during opening week at the State Legislature. The event was an informal gathering for state legislators and their staffs with exhibits, information and discussion about

historic preservation policies and objectives that would help meet the state's goal to preserve, protect and enhance Hawaii's historic and cultural heritage. Members of HHF's Board of Trustees and Public Policy committee conversed with legislators on what historic preservation is and what benefits it provides, the status of SHPD and the state's comprehensive preservation program, and recommendations from the statewide preservation plan.

#### **Property Tax Incentives**

Over the summer, Honolulu City Council held three public hearings on a bill that would have cancelled the historic commercial property tax exemption on Oʻahu. After hearing from Historic Hawaiʻi Foundation and other stakeholders, Councilmembers decided to defer the bill and leave the preservation incentive in place. HHF led the charge to retain the incentive program, which provides an exemption on 50% of the assessed value of designated historic properties that are used for commercial purposes (excluding hotel, resort and industrial). Honolulu City Council established the historic commercial property tax exemption in 2004 for the purpose of encouraging the preservation and maintenance of historically-significant buildings and structures on Oʻahu.

#### **Advisory Groups and Task Forces**

HHF's staff and delegates served on task forces or advisory groups for a variety of state and county departments, including the State Department of Transportation's Historic Bridge Inventory Advisory Group; DOT's Scenic Byways Advisory Group; Honolulu Department of Planning and Permitting Historic Sites Task Force; State Parks' Diamond Head State Monument Citizen's Advisory Group; Honolulu Transit Historic Preservation Committee; and the State Legislature's Advisory Group for Honouliuli Internment Camp.

#### **Experts at the Palace**

"Hawai'i Architectural Modernism" was the theme of the 26<sup>th</sup> Annual Experts at the Palace lecture series in January – March. HHF co-sponsored the series with the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Historic Preservation Graduate Certificate Program and the Friends of 'Iolani Palace.

#### **Historic Home Open House Events**

HHF inaugurated an occasional series of open houses to showcase the historic architecture, landscapes and cultural sites that comprise the historic fabric of the Islands. The first open house was hosted by John and Tiare Finney in their historic residence in Nu'uanu on April 13. Some 75 guests enjoyed a guided tour of the residence and historic landscape. Volunteer docents shared history and stories about the residence and unique furnishings and artifacts held within its walls.

The second open house was held July 27 at the historic home of Robert E. Fox in Mānoa. Docents shared history and lore about the architecture, interiors, art and furnishings with the 100 guests, who also enjoyed a generous array of pūpū based on menus of the large liners from the golden age of boat travel to Hawaiʻi.

## Heritage Members' Private Tour of Shangri La

On March 8, a group of 25 Heritage-level members attended a private docent-led tour of Shangri La, including the newly opened Damascus room. Shangri La, built from 1936-1938, houses Doris Duke's collection of Islamic art. Guests had a unique and memorable experience as they toured Shangri La and viewed a property nationally recognized for its high artistic value and as one of Hawaii's most architecturally significant homes. While on the upper lawn, members enjoyed breathtaking views of the property, Pacific Ocean, and Diamond Head at sunset.

#### Pau Hana with a Purpose Movie Night: Aloha Buddha

On November 21 over 100 guests attended a screening of the documentary *Aloha Buddha* at the Design Within Reach Studio at Ala Moana Shopping Center. Guests were treated to a selection of Japanese pūpū before settling into a selection of modernist chairs for the evening's seating. *Aloha Buddha* 

was an insightful award-winning documentary about three defining eras of the Japanese Buddhist experience in Hawai'i. The film was followed by a discussion with producer Lorraine Minatoishi, who shared her inspiration for the documentary, and work that she is doing to perpetuate the history and architecture of Japanese temples in Hawai'i.

## Provide Preservation Tools: Technical Assistance and Field Services

#### **Seminars and Educational Services**

HHF presented preservation seminars and discussions about the framework and context for historic preservation to three organizations during the year: Kamehameha Schools Commercial Real Estate Division (March 21), North Shore Chamber of Commerce/Hale'iwa Main Street (June 26), and the Lāna'i Filipino Community Association (August 26).

The field services also included planning and executing preservation and visioning charrettes for the Varsity Building in cooperation with landowner Kamehameha Schools in March, and for the Honouliuli Confinement Camp in October, as part of a team working with the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai'i and the State Historic Preservation Division.

#### **Field Services Highlights**

The Preservation Resource Center provided technical assistance that included over 460 interventions at 166 historic sites statewide. These actions included answering inquiries from individuals, businesses and government agencies; reviewing and submitting comments or testimony on effects to historic properties from proposed actions; and educational outreach.

HHF conducted circuit rider visits to Maui, Hawai'i Island and Lāna'i during the year.

Information services included revisions and updates to the Preservation Professionals Directory, which is published online, and completing a comprehensive redesign and migration to a new web platform.

#### Historic Homes of Waikīkī Walking Tour Map

In June, HHF published a self-guiding walking tour map of 16 historic homes located in Waikīkī. This project was taken on by HHF intern Charmaine Wong and preservation assistant Sarah Molard. The project required research of all of the historic sites within a defined walking distance of Waikīkī. Once sites were identified and researched, historic information was added for content in the brochure. Additional research identified "tourist tips" for the area.

#### Historic Property Landing Pages and Mahalo Party

The historic sites project team completed a web-based tool that summarized and published properties designated on the Hawaiii Register of Historic Places.

HHF subsequently updated and revised information services on a revised web platform. All historic property landing pages have been updated and are now available via website and mobile devices. With the completion of the online listing, HHF celebrated this project on December 17 with the project team of staff, contractors, partners and volunteers.

## Lead the Charge to Preserve & Protect: Preservation Efforts, Recognize Achievements, Protect Properties

#### **Preservation Easements**

HHF holds two preservation easements and conducted annual monitoring visits in September for the Baldwin Memorial Home in Makawao, Maui and the Jean & Zohmah Charlot House in Kāhala, Oʻahu. Both properties were found to be in good condition.

#### **Preservation Grants**

HHF continued its partnership with the Freeman Foundation to administer preservation grants to restore or preserve historic properties in community use. Previously-approved projects were completed for Laulima House, Wakamiya Inari Shrine and Chamberlain House (Oʻahu), and progress was made on the projects at Grove Farm Homestead (Kauaʻi) and Huialoha Church (Maui). Two new grants were approved, for the Old Hilo County Courthouse & Police Station (Hawaiʻi Island) and the Old Lahaina Courthouse (Maui).

The Sam & Mary Cooke Preservation Fund for Hawai'i was officially established in May with the transfer of the corpus for the endowment from HHF to the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The fund will provide grants for preservation projects in Hawai'i. The National Trust will be the fund steward and administrator; HHF will assist with grant review and implementation. No grants were made from the fund in 2013.

#### **Preservation Honor Awards**

#### **Most Endangered Historic Places**

In November, Historic Hawai'i Foundation joined with partners HONOLULU Magazine and the State Historic Preservation Division to name six additions to the list of most endangered historic places in Hawai'i. The list draws attention to contributors to Hawaii's heritage that are threatened by demolition, neglect, ignorance or apathy. While this designation does not protect or preserve the sites, it can raise awareness and motivate action.

#### Volunteers Recognized with a Historical Train Ride

HHF recognized the extraordinary support and assistance of its volunteers with a train ride on March 2 on the only active historical railroad on Oʻahu. The Hawaiian Railway Society has restored and made operable some 25 miles of track and several diesel locomotives. Before boarding the open-air cars, guests had the opportunity explore the train yard and view old locomotives and train cars on display. The 90 minute, 15 mile per hour, round-trip ride featured narration by Tom McCarthy of the Hawaiian Railway Society who retold the story of the OR&L as well as the history of trains on sugar plantations in Hawai'i. About 80 volunteers and their families participated.

The Sam and Mary Cooke Preservation Fund for Hawai'i was initiated in 2008 as the Hawai'i Preservation Fund Endowment and amended and renamed as of August 2012 under an agreement between the Foundation and the National Trust for Historic Preservation to create a dedicated funding stream for preservation projects in the Hawaiian Islands. The Agreement provides for annual grants that support cultural heritage preservation efforts, and for related technical assistance and support by the Foundation. The funds were transferred to the National Trust for Historic Preservation in May 2013 where they will be held and administered. The Bretzlaff Foundation Endowment was established in 1998 to provide support for the operations and activities of the Foundation.
