President's Message

Aloha kākou:

Historic Hawai'i Foundation's focus in 2015 was connecting people to historic places, and providing tools to help save those places.

Members toured historic Hale'iwa and saw firsthand preservation and reuse projects. Professionals, government agencies and community members were side-by-side in seminars about the registers of historic places, technical preservation classes and the



weekly lecture series. All were learning how to use various tools to support preservation efforts. Preservationists submitted testimony to county councils, planning commissions, state legislative hearings and cultural resource commission meetings to emphasize the importance of protecting and preserving neighborhoods and special places.

The pressures and threats to historic properties were seen throughout the year. The state government enacted a new law to remove preservation protections from entire classes of historic buildings, leaving residential neighborhoods ever more vulnerable. The annual additions to the Most Endangered Historic Places list also showed how a variety of threats—from natural disasters

to misguided demolition—undermine historic fabric.

But there were also successes. Various incentive programs, including tax relief for historic properties, survived attempts to repeal or weaken them, in large part due to vocal support from the preservation community. And several historic property owners reconsidered plans for demolition and instead found ways to incorporate historic places into their long-term plans.

We thank those thoughtful partners, as well as the many additional landowners, members, grassroots organizations and others who strive for protecting these special places. A special mahalo goes to our Kama'āina of the Year, Neil J.K. Hannahs. His example of culturally-based land management and community-based stewardship inspired us.

And we thank all those who provide the resources to allow us to continue this work. Financial donations, volunteering, timely advice and guidance on complex issues, and other support are critical for Historic Hawai'i Foundation's success. We appreciate all those who join in this cause.

Aloha,

Each year, we report to Historic Hawai'i Foundation members, donors, supporters and partners on the activities and achievements of the previous 12 months. One project that reached a milestone in 2015 was the designation of a new national monument—the Honouliuli Confinement Camp site. Preservationists and advocates have been researching, identifying, documenting, planning and sharing the stories of Honouliuli for two decades. These efforts were daunting at times, but the tireless commitment and courage came to fruition. We are

proud to have been part of the effort, and know that through diligence, courage and partnerships that strong outcomes are possible.

Technical assistance, educational courses, membership engagement activities and the other actions taken each year work in concert to help people save historic places. We may not know which action ultimately makes a difference, but we see the cumulative results in the sites that remain part of the fabric of our communities.

In this year, we recommitted to key values: the overriding mission goal of ho'omau (to preserve and perpetuate) and the understanding that time is of the essence as we work with discipline and urgency ('eleu ma ka hana me ke akahele pū).

Thank you for joining in the cause, and celebrating the special places of Hawai'i.

2015 YEAR IN REVIEW

PROVIDE AN ETHIC OF PRESERVATION: Planning, Policy and Education

Public Policy and Legislative Activity

At the start of the State Legislature session in January, over 70 bills were introduced that affected historic preservation. Historic Hawai'i Foundation participates in the legislative process by tracking and responding to bills and resolutions with the potential to affect historic sites and buildings. The results of the 2015 State Legislature saw some positive outcomes, but also an extremely harmful attack on the State's preservation laws, while the City & County of Honolulu affirmed its preservation incentive program.

Act 224

In the anti-preservation area, Governor David Ige signed HB830 into law on July 10, enacting it as Act 224. The Act creates an exemption from historic preservation review for proposed projects on privately-owned, single-family detached dwelling units or townhouses, unless they are listed on the register of historic places or located in a historic district. The exemption from HRS 6E-42 does not differentiate between dwellings and townhouses that have the inherent characteristics that mark historic properties ("eligible properties") from those that have reached the age for consideration but otherwise lack historic merit ("non-eligible properties").

Act 089

On the pro-preservation front, Governor Ige signed SB504 to enact Act 089, which directs the State Historic Preservation Division to conduct architectural surveys to identify properties eligible for listing on the Hawai'i Register of Historic Places, and appropriates funds for that purpose. The bill also provides funds for SHPD to implement a data management plan for the digitization of its records.

CB 28 (2015)

In June, the Honolulu City Council Budget Committee deferred action on Council Bill 28 after hearing from dozens of historic property owners and community stakeholders about the harmful effects that could result if the measure passed. CB28 proposed to change the property tax exemption provided to historic residential properties by establishing the exemption at 50% of the assessed value, rather than the full exemption currently provided.

28th Annual Experts at the Palace

“Preserving Historic Cemeteries” was the theme of the annual lecture series, which was held weekly from late January through early March at the Hawai‘i State Art Museum. The series is jointly sponsored by the Historic Preservation Program, Department of American Studies, University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa; the Friends of ‘Iolani Palace; and Historic Hawai‘i Foundation.

Historic Kaka‘ako: Photography Workshop & Tour

Kaka‘ako provided a backdrop for a sold-out architectural photography workshop and historic tour on January 18. Fifty amateur photographers gathered at Kaka‘ako Agora for a historic overview from Don Hibbard and

to learn tips from professional photographer Hawkins Biggens. They then had photo field sessions at historic buildings in the Kaka‘ako neighborhood, followed by a photo critique session and peer review. Special thanks to the presenters and venue hosts.



Historic Hale‘iwa Walking Tour

More than 50 guests gathered at the North Shore Chamber of Commerce Visitors’ Center on March 14 for a tour of historic Hale‘iwa. The docent-led tour of historic structures and sites included Hale‘iwa Shingon Mission, Lili‘uokalani Protestant Church, the buildings formerly housing Ishimoto’s Store and Nishimura Tailor Shop, Anahulu Stream Bridge, Surf N Sea Building and Lokoe Pond. Mahalo to event co-sponsor North Shore Chamber of Commerce.

State Legislature Preservation Orientation

HHF hosted a legislative briefing in open house format with a continental breakfast on January 30 at the Capitol. The event included both static and digital displays, information sheets and handouts, and featured individual discussions with policy committee, board and staff members. About 50 legislators and staff members attended.



Sam and Mary Cooke Preservation Fund for Hawai'i

More than 60 people gathered for an evening reception at the historic Linekona School in downtown Honolulu on April 30 to learn more about the Sam and Mary Cooke Preservation Fund for Hawai'i through the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

Mahalo to Sam and Mary Cooke for their longstanding support of and advocacy for historic preservation in the Islands; the National Trust for managing the grant, and to the Honolulu Museum of Art for providing the venue for the reception.

Heritage Tourism Conference

Historic Hawai'i Foundation facilitated a conference track on heritage tourism at the Hawai'i Tourism Authority's annual tourism conference in August. The conference included a session with case studies of ways to share stories and experiences with visitors, as well as two mobile workshops to showcase heritage tourism itineraries and options.

Pau Hana with a Purpose: The Artistry of Julius Shulman's Modernism

More than 60 people gathered at Design Within Reach's modern studio on October 13 for the screening of "Visual Acoustics", the story of famed architectural photographer Julius Shulman. Mahalo nui loa to Design Within Reach for co-sponsoring the event.

Nā Wahi Pana o Kāne'ohe Member Tour

On October 24, twenty-two people took part in a special cultural tour hosted by Mahealani Cypher and Rocky Kaluhiwa of the Ko'olaupoko Hawaiian Civic Club. The walk/drive event offered numerous examples of Wahi Pana or "storied places" of the Kāne'ohe-He'eia ahupua'a with stops at Pu'uwaniania Heiau, Nu'uaniu Pali lookout, Kawa'ewa'e Heiau, Naoneala'a and St. Ann's Cemetery.



Hawai'i's Most Endangered Historic Places of 2015 Announcement Event

Some 70 people gathered on November 13 for a presentation about the 2015 additions to the list of Hawai'i's Most Endangered Historic Places, and to discuss ways to save them. Updates from previously-listed sites showcased success stories—including the host venue IBM Building—as well as losses.

Architectural Photographer Darren Bradley Presentation

An audience of more than 80 enjoyed a presentation of architectural photography highlighting the Hawai'i Modern movement by Darren Bradley. Bradley's presentation paired local history with beautifully-crafted shots of Modern-style local sites and buildings. Mahalo to the event co-sponsors, Interisland Terminal and Docomomo Hawai'i.



PROVIDE PRESERVATION TOOLS: Technical Assistance and Field Services



Preservation Easements

HHF holds two preservation easements and conducted annual monitoring visits for the Jean & Zohmah Charlot house in Kāhala, O‘ahu and the Baldwin Memorial Home in Makawao, Maui. Both properties were found to be in good condition. HHF staff is working with the property owners and managers on long-range plans for use and operations to ensure compliance with the easements and appropriate stewardship.

Seminars and Education Services

Registers of Historic Places Workshops

From April to July 2015, Historic Hawai‘i Foundation conducted a series of six community workshops about the Hawai‘i and National Registers of Historic Places. Workshops were held on Kaua‘i, Maui, Hawai‘i Island (Kona and Hilo), Lāna‘i and O‘ahu and were attended by over 130 people.

Funding was provided through the Certified Local Government program of the State Historic Preservation Division and by the Cooke Foundation. The



seminar covered the process for listing properties on the historic registers. The workshops featured instructors from Historic Hawai‘i Foundation, preservation architectural firms and the State Historic Preservation Division.

Sustaining Chinatown Summer Series

Historic Hawai‘i Foundation collaborated with the Chinatown Improvement District to present a three-part technical presentation series to learn how to maintain and protect historic commercial buildings.

Lectures covered topics relevant to ongoing issues for Chinatown historic property owners, including:

- Graffiti Prevention & Removal, presented by Fung Associates, Inc., WJE, and Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation;
- Water Damage & Repair, presented by Allana Buick & Bers and Mason Architects, Inc.; and
- Tax Credits & Permitting in a Historic District, presented by Hawai‘i State Historic Preservation Division.



Preservation Grants

Freeman Foundation Grants

Our partnership with Freeman Foundation is one of the most direct ways HHF supports preservation. Historic Hawai'i Foundation works closely with the awarded sites to ensure that all work is done according to preservation standards. Grant amounts are based on the project and range from \$50,000 - \$100,000. New grants awarded in 2015 were:

Sam & Mary Cooke Preservation Fund for Hawai'i

The Cooke Preservation Fund for Hawai'i provides grant opportunities for historic properties in Hawai'i. The National Trust for Historic Preservation manages the fund, while HHF provides technical assistance to potential grantees and also assist with the selection process. The fund, which offers approximately \$13,000-\$14,000 annually to historic preservation in Hawai'i, has a \$10,000 cap and, unlike most of the other preservation funds, offers grants for brick and mortar projects. The 2014-2015 grantees are:

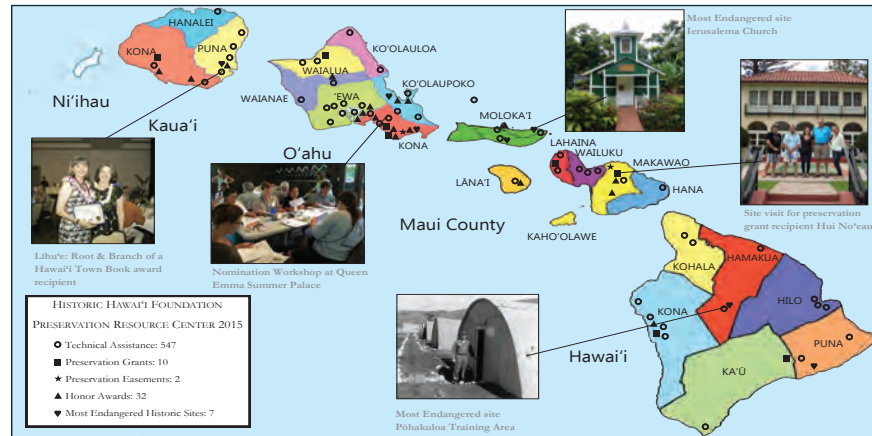

Field Services and Technical Assistance

HHF provides technical assistance, such as consultation and comments on projects, participating in public meetings, submitting testimony, and providing individual responses to inquiries. HHF assisted in 547 interventions at 200 historic sites.

Circuit Rider Visits

Preservation Resource Center staff completed circuit rider visits on Maui, Lāna'i, Kaua'i and Hawai'i Island. The field services include community meetings and site visits, technical advice and consultation meetings.





PRESERVE & PROTECT: Preservation Efforts, Recognize Achievements, Protect Properties

Honouliuli Camp National Monument

In February, President Barack Obama designated the former Honouliuli Internment Camp site on O‘ahu as a national monument, ensuring its future preservation.

Opened on March 1, 1943, Honouliuli was the longest operating and largest World War II internment and prisoner of war camp in Hawai‘i. Built on 160 acres in west O‘ahu, the camp site was hidden from view in a deep gulch that the internees called *jigoku dani*, or “hell valley.”

The effort to identify, document, evaluate and plan for the preservation of the site has been an ongoing process for over two decades. Historic Hawai‘i Foundation served on advisory groups and planning teams, along with the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai‘i, National Park Service, State Historic Preservation Division, landowner Monsanto, University of Hawai‘i West O‘ahu and other stakeholders. The effort to evaluate and document the site was also supported by a Preservation Fund for Hawai‘i grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation (a joint program with HHF), as well as grants from the National Park Service Japanese American Confinement Sites program.

Consultations

Through both State and Federal historic preservation and environmental review processes, HHF worked closely with public agencies in a consultation capacity to encourage preservation of our state’s many significant historic places. HHF became a concurring party to three projects and signed the agreement documents as a concurring party for the MARFORPAC project at Camp Smith, Queen Ka‘ahumanu Highway and Marine Corps Base Hawai‘i Hangar undertakings.

Preservation Honor Awards

The 41st Annual Preservation Honor Awards ceremony took place on May 29. HHF announced 32 awards in exemplary achievement in the field of historic preservation; 12 anniversary recognitions of local organizations; and included the presentation of the 7th Annual Frank Haines Award. 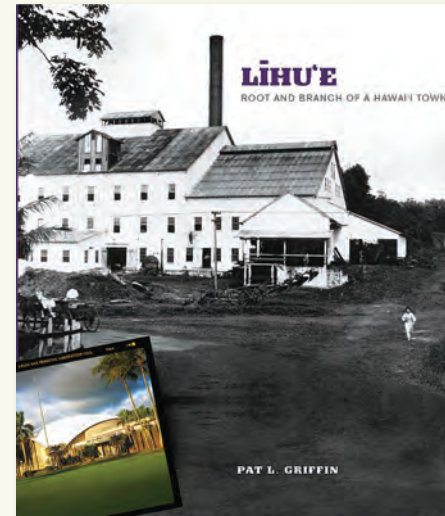

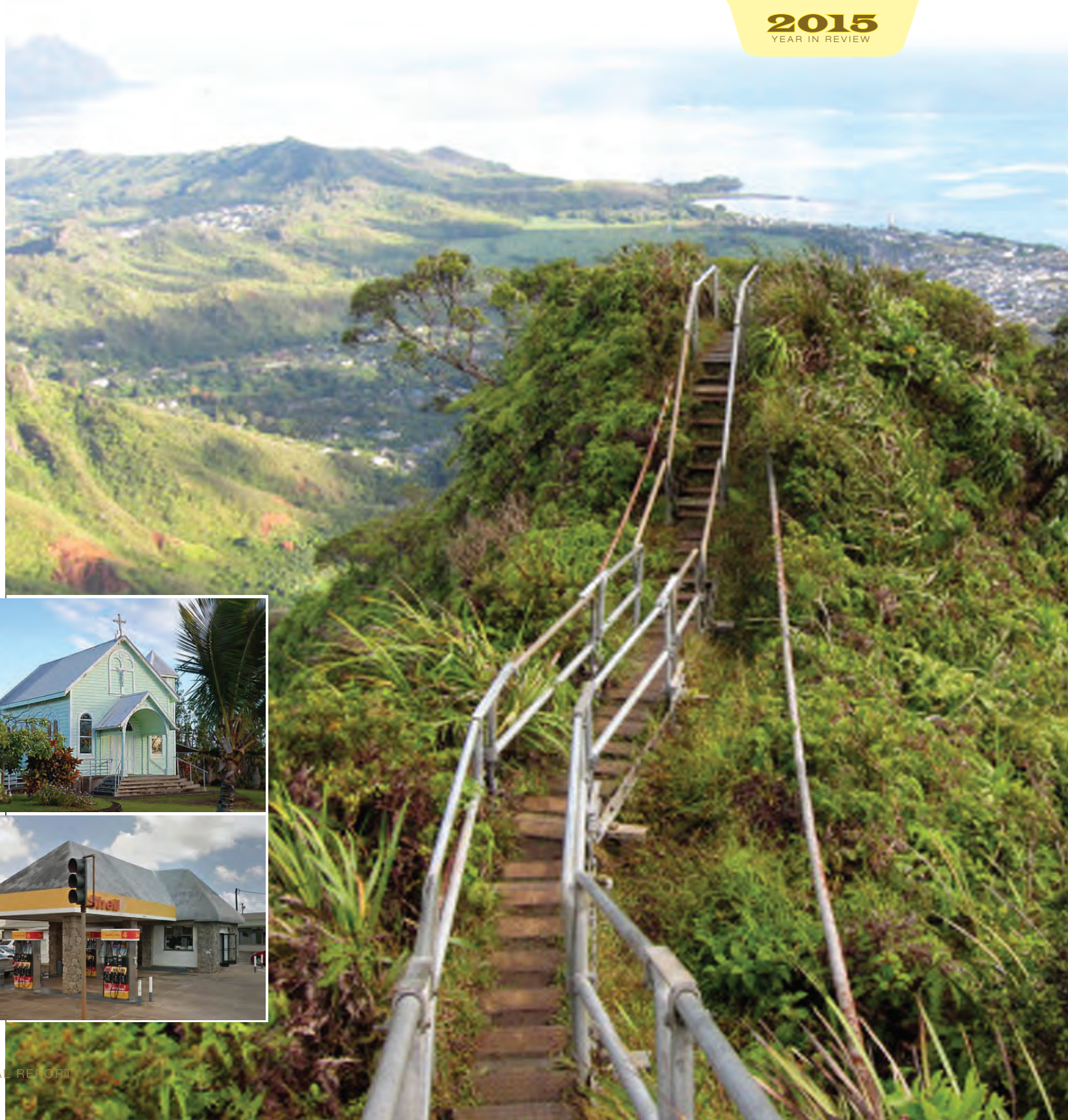
