President's Message



Aloha. The challenges of the Covid pandemic dominated concerns both in Hawai'i and across the globe throughout 2021. As in the prior year, Historic Hawai'i Foundation continued to limit in-person gathering and events in order to slow the spread of the disease and support public health efforts. We held only two in-person programs and once again canceled the annual Kama'āina of the YearTM benefit during the calendar year.

Although the pandemic continued as the background to daily life, Historic Hawai'i Foundation was stalwart in providing new and creative ways to educate, advocate, assist and protect historic places. The variety and depth of online programming included presentations and discussions, film screenings, archival protection, GISenabled Story Maps and technical trainings.

A virtual art exhibit, "Serendipity," allowed artists to submit their creative works that depict favorite historic places throughout the Islands, giving new perspectives on familiar landmarks.

During a brief period when the public health restrictions eased, we held a hands-on training for tools and techniques in repairing historic wooden windows. This workshop marked the first step in a planned series to support craftsmanship and job creation based on traditional trades.

These and other engagements demonstrated that even in challenging times, our community can focus on the places and events that connect us. Historic Hawai'i Foundation is proud to be part of the community resilience movement that makes us all stronger.

We are deeply appreciative of the support that both sustains and energizes the cause of people saving historic places. Mahalo nui to the members, partners, sponsors, supporters and volunteers who helped make 2021 a year to remember.

SOME HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE YEAR INCLUDE:

- Supported students and emerging professionals. Eight interns from UH-Manoa's Community Design Center and UH-Hilo's History Department engaged in preservation projects and activities.
- New partnerships expand assistance programs. We established a new partnership to provide funding and technical assistance to Native Hawaiian Organizations with stewardship responsibilities for historic and cultural sites. HHF's grant partnerships provided funding to 16 new preservation projects.
- Provided educational and engagement opportunities to learn about, care for and save historic properties through programs that included 24 public programs.
- Recognized achievements in the field of preservation and advocated for special places through the 2021 Annual Preservation Honor Awards.

- · Resolved adverse effects through formal agreements with federal agencies. HHF signed as a concurring party to five Section 106 Agreements for undertakings with the Federal HighwayAdministration, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Homeland Security and the Army Corps
- Provided technical assistance with 668 interventions for the year, a 5% increase over 2020.
- · Supported public policies, legislative and regulatory frameworks that provide for preservation outcomes, including submitting testimony to the 2021 State Legislative Session some 25 times on 16 separate bills and resolutions. Further details of these outcomes begin on page 3.

Advocate

Support public policies, legislative and regulatory frameworks that provide incentives and regulations for preservation outcomes.

STATE LEGISLATURE

The 2021 legislative session included introduction of some 20 bills directly related to historic preservation and another 75 related to environment, land use, development, culture, burials or specific historic sites. The HHF policy team monitored the 95 bills and responded to committee notices and submitted testimony about 25 times on 16 separate bills and resolutions.

The most significant bill that passed and was signed by the Governor over HHF's objections reduces the composition of the Hawai'i Historic Places Review Board membership from ten to seven appointees. HHF's testimony noted:

"The strength of the Review Board is related to its diversity and inclusion. It is important for the Board to have a variety of professional backgrounds and experience, to have knowledge of different geographic areas and represent all islands, to understand and be sensitive to community knowledge and input, to reflect the ethnic and demographic diversity of the state, and to possess personal characteristics of public service and integrity. It would be imprudent to reduce the composition of the Board by 30%. This would eliminate areas of knowledge and perspectives that offer value and benefit."





CITY & COUNTY OF HONOLULU ORDINANCES

In January 2021, the Honolulu City Council Committee on Zoning and Planning considered a proposal from the City's Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) to repeal the O'ahu Historic Preservation Commission established by ROH Chapter 3 Article 10. Councilmembers did not approve the DPP proposal and instead decided to review the ordinance, address any out-of-date or unworkable provisions, and to refresh and strengthen the ordinance for implementation.

Councilmember Esther Kiaʻāina asked a small working group of preservation experts to review the ordinance and prepare recommendations. Working group members were Kehaunani Abad, Māhealani Cypher and Kiersten Faulkner. The working group submitted its recommendations to Councilmember Kiaʻāina in Spring 2021 for her consideration and potential distribution to the full Council. A bill was introduced in Summer 2022.



Assist

PRESERVATION EASEMENTS

HHF managed its portfolio of significant buildings protected in perpetuity by preservation easements. The program includes three properties: Dearborn Building (Kaka'ako, Oʻahu); Jean & Zohmah Charlot House (Kāhala, Oʻahu); and Fred C. Baldwin Memorial Home (Makawao, Maui).

Dearborn Building

Rehabilitation and adaptive use of the Dearborn Building was completed in early 2021 and the former warehouse reopened as the Hawai'i flagship store for Patagonia. HHF reviewed and approved the rehabilitation plans in accordance with the easement. The project also utilized federal historic tax credits. In July, HHF reviewed and approved the ten-year maintenance plan for the building and site. The maintenance plan describes the character-defining features, assesses condition and prescribes maintenance actions by feature, material and timeframe.

Charlot House

HHF entered into an agreement with UHCDC to develop an emergency management plan for the Charlot House to address potential flooding and adaptation to protect against storms and sea level change. The Project includes research, evaluation and developing treatment recommendations, plans and specifications for methods to protect the property from floods, hurricane, tsunami and storms in a manner that preserves the character-defining historic features.

The project is under the direction of UHCDC Director Cathi Ho Schar, with assistance from Dr. Karl Kim, director of the National Disaster Preparedness Training Center, and UH School of Architecture Professor Wendy Meguro.

PRESERVATION GRANTS

ARCHIVING PROJECTS

Nancy Bannick Collection

In 2019, Historic Hawai'i Foundation donated a unique collection of photographs, slide transparencies and photo negatives to the Hawai'i State Archives. Thou-

from the School of Architecture as interns. In June, two interns began training to learn the labor-intensive process under the supervision of the Hawai'i State Archives' library technician, Clara Hur. With an impressive amount of discipline and attention to detail, by early November Hur and the interns had finished processing nearly 3,300 slides.

Not only is the collection much larger than anticipated—over 6,000 images—a significant number of them require mold removal and housing replacement in order to prevent further deterioration and preserve them. Temporary closures of the Archives due to the pandemic caused interruptions, prolonging the project.

HHF's donation agreement with the Archives states that the collection will be integrated with the Archives' existing Nancy Bannick Collection. After the accessioning process is complete, the materials will be made available to the public via the Archives' digital library for research or other appropriate use.

City & County of Honolulu Special Design District Photo Collections

The Honolulu Department of Planning and Permitting donated photographic prints and files to HHF from the 1990's project that developed design guidelines for Honolulu's special design districts: Chinatown, Academy of Arts/Thomas Square, Punchbowl, Hale'iwa and Waikīkī. HHF is assessing the collection for future archiving and management for public access.

FIELD SERVICES, TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE & CIRCUIT RIDER VISITS

HHF provides technical assistance, including consultation and comment on plans, project, participating in public meeting and hearings, submitting official testimony and response to inquiries from the public. HHF staff engaged in 668 interventions at over 250 historic properties during the year.

Circuit rider visits were cancelled due to travel and public safety restrictions during the Covid pandemicand will resume once it is safe to do so.



Educate

Build awareness, understanding and public support for historic preservation and serve as spokesperson for the cause.





PRESERVATION IN PRACTICE WEBINARS


The series was a partnership with the Department of the Interior's National Park Service and Office of Native Hawaiian Relations.

- January 27: Identifying Historic Properties, an overview of types of historic designations, the criteria for determining if a property meets the criteria to be considered historic and an introduction to the process used to nominate and designate historic properties.
- March 24: Treatment of Historic Properties: Standards and Guidelines, assessment and treatment of historic properties, including concepts of the treatment types; standards for rehabilitation; best practices for assessment and implementation; special considerations for buildings such as for the American Disabilities Act, sustainability, flood adaptation and code compliance; special considerations for sites such as archaeology and cultural landscapes.

- May 26: Native Hawaiian Burial Protection, Native Hawaiian burial treatment and protection and the laws and procedures that govern them, including the Native American Graves Repatriation Act.
- December 8: Funding for Stewards of Historic Properties, workshop on National Park Ser-

vice, Historic Hawai'i Foundation and other funding from foundations and government agencies that help with stewardship and rehabilitation efforts for historic properties and for educational, interpretive and other heritage programs.







PRESERVATION TRAININGS WITH OTHER PARTNERS

• June 9: Preservation and Conservation Easements program was a partnership with the Trust for Public Land and Hawai'i Land Trust. The training presented an overview of the definitions, criteria and considerations for using perpetual conservation and preservation easements to protect the intrinsic characteristics of special places, including lands with natural, agricultural and cultural values and buildings with historic significance.

· June 30: Nature + Culture Connection: Indigenous Solutions to Climate Change was a partnership with the County of Maui, Mayor's Office of Climate Change, Sustainability, and Resiliency and The Nature Conservancy, Hawai'i and Palmyra. Presented through the framework of ancestral practice as contemporary innovation, the seminar highlighted how restoration and reclamation of traditional sites and cultural practices is a means to address contemporary issues like mitigation, resilience and adaptation to climate change.

· August 5, 6 and 7: Wooden Window Workshop. This threeday hands-on training for repair of wooden windows included instruction by Alan Shintani, Barbara Shideler and Lucien Swerdloff; collectively, they represented expertise in master carpentry, historic architecture and restoration techniques. The program included classroom instruction at the **Building Industry Association of** Hawai'i shop and hands-on work at the 'Ewa Community Church in the 'Ewa Villages Historic District. Additional partners included Unitek, which donated lead abatement services for lead paint on the windows; the Hawai'i Carpenters Apprenticeship and Training Fund and Transportation & Trades Division, and the construction program at Honolulu Community College.

NATIVE HAWAIIAN ORGANIZATION STEWARD-SHIP TRAINING PROGRAM

In September 2021, Historic Hawai'i Foundation was selected as a partner to the U.S. Department of the Interior to develop and

implement a new program to partner with Native Hawaiian Organizations on hands-on stewardship training for the preservation of historic and cultural sites that are significant to Native Hawaiian organizations and communities. The five-year cooperative agreement supports building capacity of NHOs towards historic preservation and stewardship with the goal of ensuring that their traditional cultural stories and places are being documented, preserved and shared in an appropriate manner with visitors and residents alike.

During the program, NHOs will be invited to develop site-specific proposals to conduct preservation trainings, including hands-on activities to save places. The training units will include field work at their respective historic sites to preserve and restore places that are significant to the culture, traditions, and practices of the Native Hawaiian Community.

EXPERTS LECTURE SERIES: CHANGING INTERPRETA-TIONS OF NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARKS



"SERENDIPITY: EXPRESSING CONNECTIONS OF PEOPLE + PLACE + THE PAST" VIRTUAL ART EXHIBIT

HHF hosted a virtual art exhibit to showcase works that were inspired by a place that was at least 50 years old and located in the Hawaiian Islands. The online art show was available from August 1 until September 7, 2021. HHF received 62 entries in drawing, painting, photography, printmaking, collage and poetry. About one-third of the pieces were offered for sale by the artists.

More than 400 people voted for their favorite piece. The People's Choice Awards and Honorable Mentions were announced at the Annual Meeting on August 16, 2021.

HILO STORY MAP

The Hilo Story Map is the third in a series of self-guided, historic walking tours utilizing a digital online platform accessible from a cell phone or tablet. It presents information spanning three eras: early period (pre-contact through early 19th century); 19th century; and 20th century (demarcated by the 1946 and 1960 tsunamis). The Story Map focuses on the area between the Wailuku and Wailoa Rivers and provides information on the history, archaeology, architecture and cultural properties located in the district.

The project is a collaboration between Historic Hawai'i Foundation, Cultural Surveys Hawai'i, University of Hawai'i at Hilo's History Department, Lyman Museum and an archeologist, Lokelani Brandt. On December 10th, HHF hosted a presentation and panel discussion.

EXPLORATIONS OF PLACE, PRACTICE AND **PRESERVATION**

The virtual presentations to explore historic places, identification processes, preservation efforts and contemporary interpretations of meaning continued with a variety of guest speakers, film screenings and panel discussions.

- February 17: Plants & Place: Native Hawaiian Culture. Ethnobotany and Restoration at Lyon Arboretum. The program was a partnership with the Harold S. Lvon Arboretum. Content included an overview of the cultural history of Mānoa Valley and the origin story of Lyon Arboretum which celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2018. The story of famed ethnobotanist Beatrice Kapua'okalani Hilmer Krauss was broached along with a dive into Hawaiian ethnobotany.
- March 30: Film Screening of Patsy Mink: Ahead of the *Majority.* The screening of the documentary film was followed by a discussion with filmmaker Kimberlee Bassford.

- May 5: Establishing the Kahoʻolawe Island Reserve Presentation & Panel. This event was a partnership with the King Kamehameha V Judiciary History Center and 'Ulu Lehua Scholars Program featuring Stanton Enomoto; Michael Naho'opi'i of Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC), and Davianna McGregor of the Protect Kahoʻolawe 'Ohana.
- May 24: Film Screening of Hawaiian Soul and Panel Discus**sion:** The panel discussion with filmmaker 'Āina Paikai, producer Kaliko Ma'i'i, executive producer Lāiana Kanoa-Wong, and co-producer Justyn Ah Chong was moderated by Hawai'i State Film Commissioner and HHF Trustee Donne Dawson.
- July 24: Exploring Art + **Historic Places: Sketch and** history event at Foster Botanical Gardens. We hosted our first in-person event since February 2020 with a sketching event at Foster Botanical Gardens.

- · September 30: Kapi'olani Community College 75th Anniversary: Kaiāulu Webinar Series- Back in the Dav: 1946 Facts and Throwback Presentation. HHF joined Kapi'olani Community College (KCC) for a virtual presentation in honor of its 75th Anniversary. To commemorate this milestone anniversary, KCC created a free presentation highlighting historical events, people and trivia from the school's founding year, 1946.
- · October 27: Kai Piha: Nā Loko I'a: Talk Story with Filmmaker & **Stewards.** The program included a film screening and moderated discussion with filmmaker Anne Marie Kirk and site stewards of three of O'ahu's historic fishponds: Kanewai Loko I'a, Pa'aiau Loko I'a, and Huilua Loko I'a.
- · December 14: Pathways to **Place: An Ethnohistorical Study** of the Merwin Conservancy at Pe'ahi, Maui, and Exploration of Land as a Repository of the Past. A moderated discussion explored the theme of place literacy and land as receptacle of collective and multilayered histories with Kepā and Onaona Maly of Kumu Pono Associates and the Merwin Conser-



vancy's executive director, Sonnet Kekilia Coggins.

STUDENTS AND LIFELONG LEARNERS

HHF participated in outreach and educational activities throughout the year.

· Historic Preservation Self-**Directed Study:** Arlene Salomon. a student in the Master's program at the School of Interior Architecture + Design at Academy of Art University in San Francisco, engaged on a project-driven independent study on historic preservation. The study and project are a collaboration with project partners Katie Stephens, an historic preservation architect at Architects Hawai'i Ltd (AHL) and Jessica Munoz, executive director of Ho'ōla Na Pua (New Life for Our Children), a nonprofit organization founded to prevent sex trafficking and providing care for children who have been exploited. The preservation project will enhance the historic features and interpretation at the Ho'ōla Na Pua campus. The 12-acre property is on the site of the former Waile'e Industrial School on O'ahu's North Shore.

• University of Hawai'i Community Design Center: HHF established two internships with UHCDC during the year. The first was an agreement to provide two student assistants to the Hawai'i State Archives to work on the preservation of the Nancy Bannick Collection. The interns were Kenneth Guillen and Connie Kwan.

A separate agreement was to support the development of an emergency management plan for the Charlot House to address potential flooding and adaptation to protect against storms and sea level change. Intern Creesha Layaoen was selected for the project.

• University of Hawai'i – Hilo:

HHF executed an internship agreement with University of Hawai'i at Hilo History Department to support training in historical research methods and applications, archival research, hands-on learning and place-based studies for the Hilo Story Map project. The interns worked under the direction of History Professor Kerri Inglis, who included the project as part of the classwork requirement for other students in the history program.

Protect

Intervene and support preservation of sites, buildings, structures, objects and districts of historic significance, and intangible heritage that brings life to those properties.

PRESERVATION HONOR AWARDS

The 47th Annual Preservation Honor Awards were held as a live-stream event from the historic

Hawai'i Theater in Honolulu's Chinatown on May 21. Restrictions on public gathering due to the Covid-19 pandemic limited the number of people who could be present in person. Instead, the event was broadcast live and recorded for later viewing. Masters of Ceremony Peter Apo and Brickwood Galuteria recognized 13 Preservation Award honorees and major anniversaries of 18 local organizations and companies.

Hawai'i Architectural Foundation Paepae I Ka Pōhaku Award

The Hawai'i Architectural Foundation presented the Paepae I Ka Pōhaku Award to Historic Hawai'i Foundation's Executive Director Kiersten Faulkner for her sustained efforts to raise community awareness of architectural design and the importance of the built environment. Faulkner is the third recipient of the Award.





COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The Covid-19 pandemic continued for a second year, with recurring peak transmission rates and responding restrictions on public gathering. HHF continued to conduct business remotely, with all staff primarily working from home and very few in-person events in the brief period when gathering restrictions were eased.

MEMBERSHIP. ANNUAL FUND AND BOARD MATCHING **CHALLENGE**

In response to the uncertainty and continued needs, HHF's members and donors continued to support the organization with generous and consistent support. The Board of Trustees issued a matching donation opportunity asking members to contribute to match the Board members' lead gift. Members responded with support through membership dues, annual fund contributions and additional gifts and support.

RESTORE, RECOVER AND REENERGIZE CAMPAIGN

HHF's traditional annual fundraising event—the Kama'āina of the Year Benefit—was again canceled. In lieu of the event, corporate and other sponsors donated to the yearend request for support.

COVID RELIEF SUPPORT

HHF was the recipient of several grants and government programs designed to provide Covid relief, totaling \$100,000.

NEW GRANTS AND PROGRAM SUPPORT

Foundations and philanthropists provided funds that were restricted for program support. New grants were received during the year to support the educational programming, develop new Story Maps, provide stipends for internships, develop information materials and videos, advance specific programs related to the NHO Stewardship Training, and provide hands-on rehabilitation and restoration projects.

Grant support received in prior years was used to implement programs that included the Wooden Windows Workshop and the Bannick Archives preservation.
