This week there has begun an interesting project in training of waiters and waitresses for restaurant work. The territorial department of public instruction, with the cooperation of the Oahu Restaurant association, is conducting two class groups in room 31 of McKinley high school.

The first group meets from 9 to 10:30 a. m. Monday and Wednesday for four consecutive weeks beginning October 14. The second group meets from 2:30 to 4 p. m. Tuesday and Thursday for four consecutive weeks, beginning today. If any student in one group has to miss a class, he can make up his or her work at the following meeting of the other group.

Certificates will be issued to each employe who has successfully completed the course. The certificates will be sponsored by the Oahu Restaurant association and the department of public instruction.

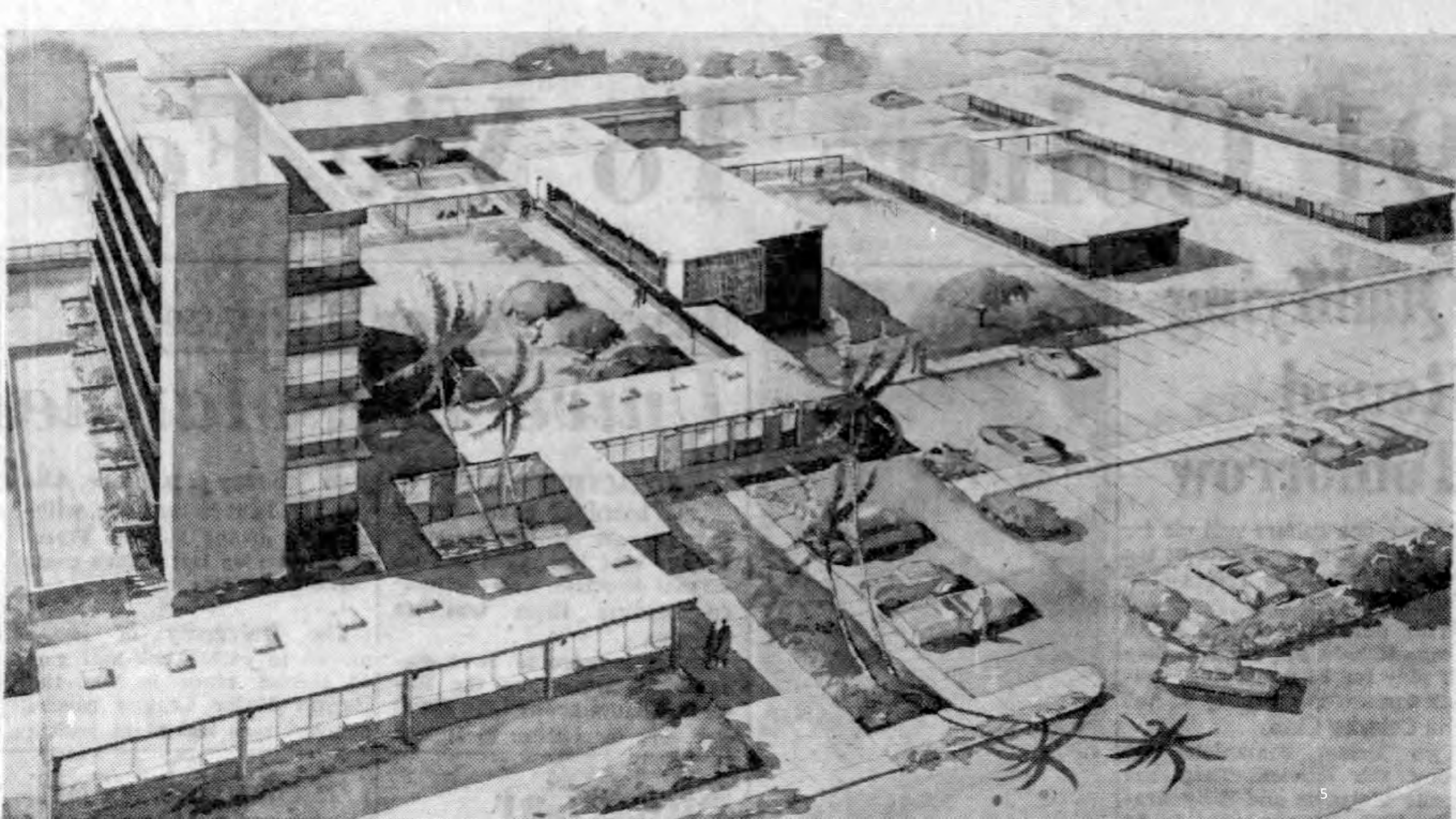
The department of public instruction and the Oahu Restaurant association also have an interesting and helpful training for hosts and hostesses.

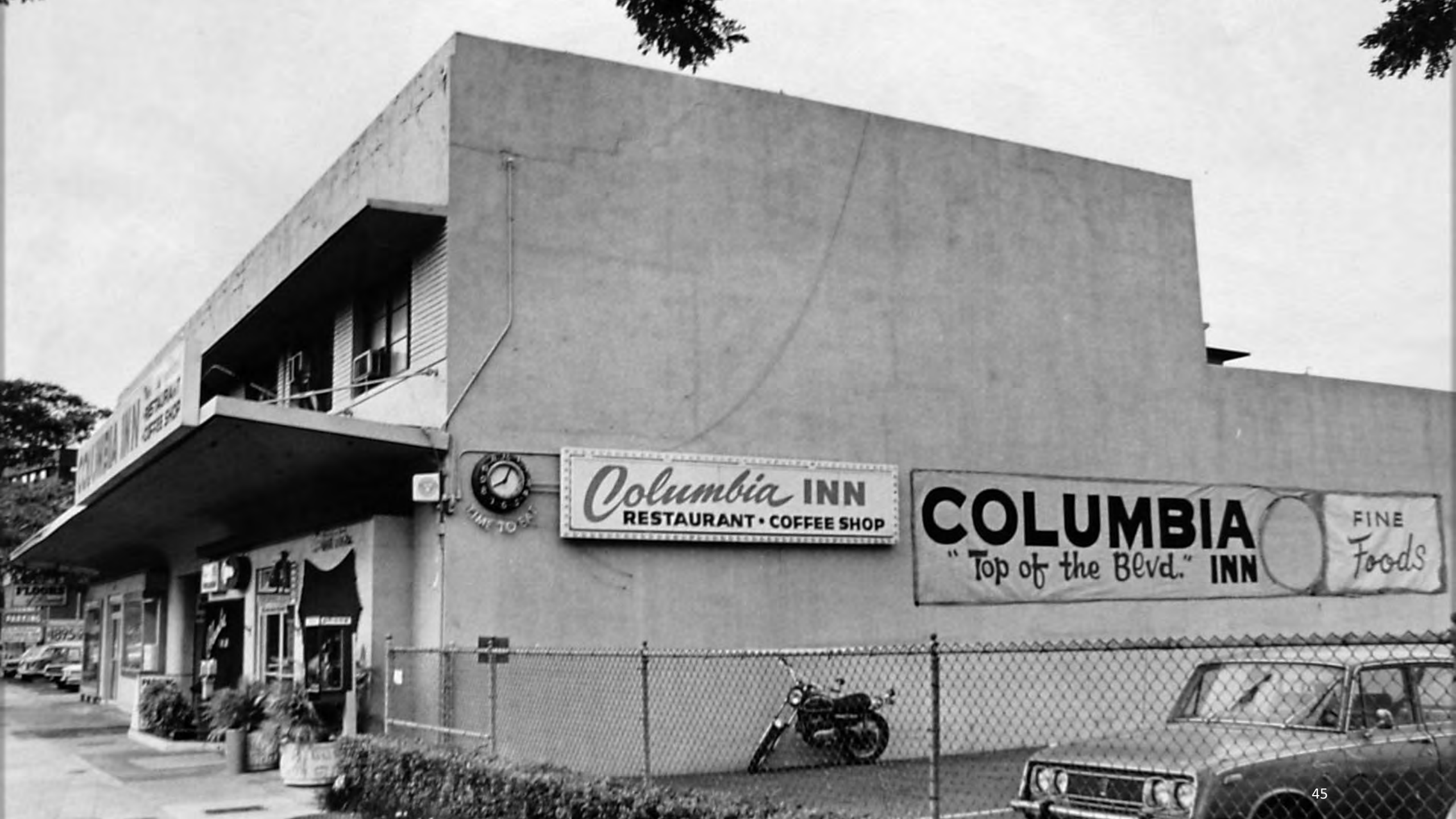
