

'Containment Landscape 29, Kilohana' is based on photographs I took at the Pu'u La'au ranger cabin on the leeward slopes of Mauna Kea on Hawai'i Island. The cabins and water tank are just north of the Palila Forest Discovery Trail, one of the last homes to endangered native birds such as the Palila and 'Elepaio as well as to a variety of native plants, such as Māmane and Naio that are pictured in this artwork. The collages I create are reconstructed landscapes based on an energetic or spiritual interpretation of a place, rather than an exact depiction.

Ho'omana'o Kaua'i

"Ho'omana'o Kaua'i" addresses the local issue of climate change while highlighting the age and vastness of the islands. The piece depicts the Nāpali Coast, the oldest mountain range on the main islands. Whilst creating this piece, Kaua'i suffered from historic rainfall that resulted in the shutdown of the area. Because no visitors were allowed in the years following, the land was able to heal from its mistreatment. This served as a reminder that human maltreatment of nature is strengthening natural disasters, which will lead to the disappearance of sacred sites, like this one. Nonetheless, we can still change this fate.



This particular work borrows Van Gogh's "Starry Night" to illustrate the Aloha Tower, and with the title in Japanese, evokes a tourist asking the viewer, "Where is the Aloha Tower?"




Pang's House, Waipahu Study no. 27

A first observation of the Pang's house concerns the extraordinary extent of the water and marsh surrounding, with the great older trees forming a continuous canopy overhead. Such a setting might be associated with a windward environment, yet here in Waipahu was a place of richly abundant water and lush landscape. After continual clearing over a period of years, including the removal of the large trees, the house was left open to view. Finally, the house itself was gone, and all that remains today is a generally featureless lawn.
